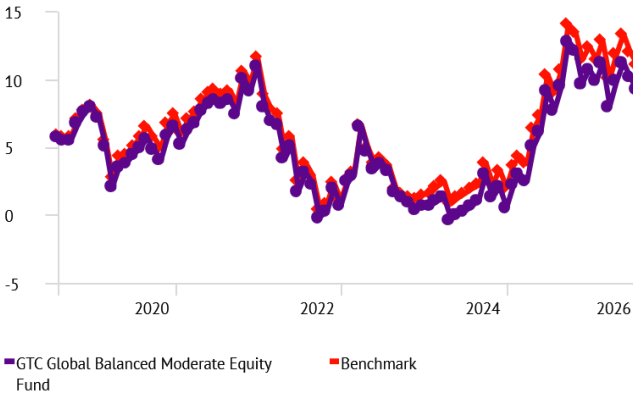

Rolling returns (%)

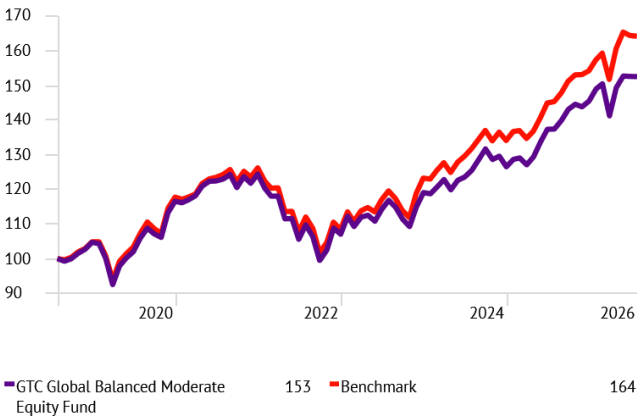

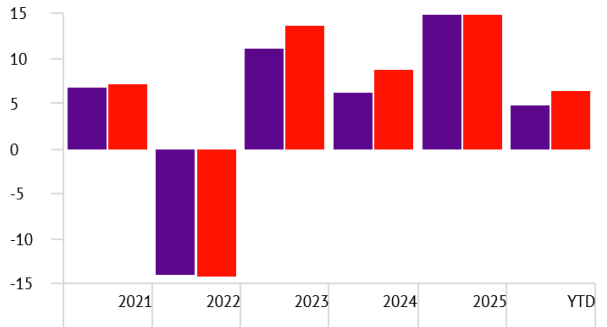

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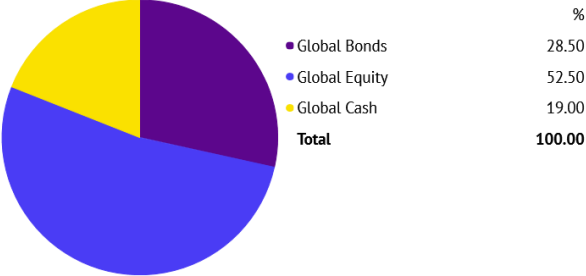

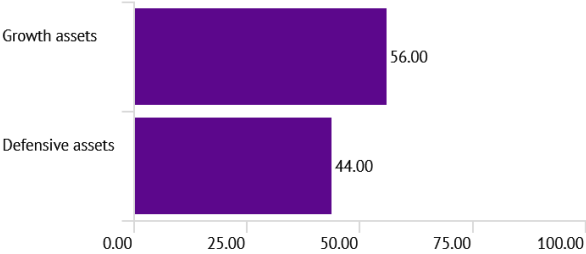

Quarterly commentary

- Global markets were resilient in the second quarter of 2026, despite the shock caused by conflict in the Middle East. Investor confidence was supported by continued excitement around Artificial Intelligence (AI) and companies linked to the AI investment cycle.
- Higher energy prices kept upward pressure on global inflation expectations. Brent crude oil rose to almost \$120 per barrel during the quarter, before easing back to around \$70 per barrel as peace talks continued towards quarter-end. However, uncertainty remains around the reopening of the Strait of Hormuz, and tensions between the US and Iran have not been fully resolved.
- In response to higher global inflation, the South African Reserve Bank raised interest rates by 0.25%, from 6.75% to 7.00%, at its May meeting. The European Central Bank increased its deposit facility rate by 0.25% to 2.25%, while the US Federal Reserve kept rates unchanged at a target range of 3.50% to 3.75%.
- The MSCI Emerging Markets Index gained +24.1% USD over the quarter. Much of this strength came from technology shares in Taiwan and South Korea, particularly companies involved in semiconductor manufacturing such as Taiwan Semiconductor Manufacturing Company, SK Hynix and Samsung Electronics. The MSCI World Index rose by +13.8% USD, supported by companies outside of the 'Magnificent 7' which are linked to the AI investment cycle.
- The US dollar weakened -4.2% against South African Rand over the quarter, supported by a retreat in the price of Brent Crude and an increase in South African interest rates.

Glossary

Standard deviation

Is a measure that is used to quantify the amount of variation or dispersion of a set of data values around the mean value. This measure is commonly known as volatility and referenced as an explicit measure of risk.

Maximum drawdown

Is the maximum loss from a peak to a trough of a portfolio before a new peak is attained. Maximum Drawdown is an indicator of downside risk over a specified time period.

Sharpe ratio

Is a measure for calculating risk-adjusted return, and this ratio has become the industry standard for such calculations. The Sharpe ratio is the average return earned in excess of the risk-free rate per unit of volatility or total risk. In other words, it measures how much excess return a portfolio has earned in relation to the level of risk it is exposure to. The higher the ratio the stronger the risk adjusted return.

Calmar ratio

Is a measure for calculating risk-adjusted return. It is the average return earned per unit of capital loss risk taken in the form of maximum drawdown over a given period.
